African regional and continental processes to control the spread of illicit SALW and the negative impact on human security are some of the oldest initiatives in the international community.

Clearly, joint action on a single issue of the Peace and Security Agenda is not only dependent on the political will to sign and ratify agreements but on the will to implement them, which in turn is dependent on the capacity of those agencies that will have to enforce and implement these agreements. To assist in strengthening operational capacity of law enforcement agencies tasked with this job in Africa, SaferAfrica has produced, jointly with Saferworld, a training manual that is being applied by regional coordinating secretariats in Africa. The Reference and Operations Manual for National Focal Points on Small Arms and Light Weapons is a product of lessons learnt through five years of active implementation assistance of two organisations, SaferAfrica and Saferworld.

The master class is a summary of best practices based on the training and reference manual — all participants to the master class will receive a copy of the manual. The master class will assist those participating in understanding the basic requirements for implementation of SALW initiatives in Africa, and the experiences obtained in so doing. The master class is intended to provide those participating with a general understanding on the best practices in Africa associated with implementing legally and politically binding agreements on small arms management and disarmament. The master class will also disseminate information on the best practices and the results obtained when implementation capacity is strengthened.

TERRORISM AND ARMS PROLIFERATION AS A HUMANITARIAN CONCERN

The master class will look at the various initiatives which have been undertaken on terrorism at an African continental, regional and national level. At an Africa continental level, the legal framework has been developed through the Protocol and Convention on Terrorism, and a Centre on Terrorism has been established in Algeria. The master class will consider the mandate, and activities of this Centre. At a regional level, the focus on combating terrorism revolves around making the various legal stipulations operational through the practical adoption of measures to enhance law enforcement.

These include, amongst others, training of the police and the enhancement of regional coordination. For example in Southern Africa, the Southern African Regional Police Chiefs Coordinating Organisation (SARPCCO) have established a Terrorism Desk which is linked to the Regional Early Warning Desk. At a national level, there have been a number of initiatives to enhance the capacity of law enforcement personnel to deal with terrorism. For example, the Government of South Africa adopted an extremely strict Anti-Terrorism legislation, providing the framework under which the law enforcement personnel in the country operate with regards to terrorism. The following will be discussed during this master class:
